Plain Sailing? Brittany Ferries Celebrates Its Fifty Years With Twinners

On Monday 2nd January Twinners from all over Devon joined Twinners from Brittany and distinguished guests aboard the 'flagship' of the Brittany Ferries fleet - the Pont-Aven - in Plymouth for a party. The party was to celebrate 50 years of the company's existence. A company which has come a very long way since its original conception and early beginnings. Fifty years ago a group of French farmers in Brittany realised there was an opportunity to export their fresh produce to the UK and they used one ship to transport cauliflowers and artichokes to ports along the south coast. Soon they realised there was a demand for human transport too and that is how they began to grow and became not just a freight line but a passenger line also. Brittany farmers still own 50 per cent of the shares in the company.

Whilst it is true that we as Twinners soaked up the free hospitality of Brittany Ferries, I feel we were all a very good advertisement for the strength of and meaning of Twinning, and it was the most sociable and convivial of events. I felt proud to represent Axminster Twinning Association but I also felt proud of the movement, and the fact that Brittany Ferries reached out to us speaks volumes.

I understand that it happened like this. Brittany Ferries had the idea that to celebrate their 50 years they would transport Breton Twinners from Roscoff to Plymouth and invite their 'homologues' or other Twinning representatives from Devon to join them aboard. However this invitation was undersubscribed and then someone had the excellent idea (I think it is Ann Hallett from Starcross we have to thank for this) that via the Devon Twinning Circle the invitation could be extended to towns in Devon twinned with Normandy. This is how my husband and I got involved. (Axminster is twinned with Douvres la Délivrande in Normandy). There then followed an over-subscription and sadly not everyone who applied could be accommodated.

Even though the Pont-Aven was at anchor in Plymouth we had all the usual check-ins - passport control, body and luggage searches, and a long wait during which we met Twinners from Brecon (is that in Devon??!!) carrying a very heavy package to give to their friends from Gouesnou who they were meeting aboard. Whilst queueing we had also met the retired financial manager who then became the managing director of Brittany Ferries who told us that the cost of building the Pont-Aven twenty years ago was 200 million pounds.

Once in the sumptuous bar as we were not meeting 'homologues' we fell into conversation with others. An elderly man from Brest, Monsieur François Le Breton (coincidental name!) the captain of the Pont-Aven, a current Pilot who'd brought the ferry to Plymouth that day, and a retired Pilot who had worked for Brittany Ferries at Portsmouth for 40 years and who spoke of some of the changes he'd seen: 'when we started the boats were small; now they are huge.'

Moët et Chandon flowed and canapés were carried round by waiters and waitresses. The loud music being played through speakers did make conversation difficult but soon there was a change in the proceedings and there was an announcement about photographs and then the live music began, played by the Breton band Dremmwel, billed on the programme thus: 'whose gentle tunes have been used as wake-up music in our cabins for decades'. This was not a view shared by the partner of the Pilot who told us that these dulcet tones made her feel suicidal first thing in the morning!

While the music played more champagne bottles were uncorked and more platters of canapés were produced. Eventually to the accompaniment of a traditional Breton tune a snake of dancers joined hands spontaneously and threaded their way through the assembled crowd.

We headed towards the restaurant and fell into conversation with two French women who told us that there were 350 guests here this evening. This same pair became our table companions. The younger woman was getting anxious as her brother was one of the chefs and she knew that things were running a bit late and that this was difficult when you were catering for such large numbers. She was 'présidente' of the

We began with the ever-wonderful self-service buffet with no system in place so it became a bit of a scramble! This was followed by chicken cooked in cider with pasta and vegetables in a sage butter, and then a delicate green bombe of fluff and filling on a bed of glistening paper-thin slices of Granny Smith apples. The white wine was Sancerre, the red Noaillac.

After the meal there were speeches but the geography of the dining area prevented us from having sight of the speakers. So we just listened. Eventually the group of seven chefs in their tall hats came out from the kitchen and there was clapping and adulation and more words spoken.

We'd been told that without fail we needed to get off the boat by 9.00pm to avoid being taken back to Roscoff but I overheard as we were leaving that the sailing had been delayed until 11.00pm just to be on the safe side!

Thank you to Brittany Ferries for a wonderful reception and an event that illuminated an otherwise dark winter's night.
