# THE BURNHAM-ON-SEA & HIGHBRIDGE – FRITZLAR TWINNING SOCIETY 35th ANNIVERSARY VISIT 2024



Seen off at 7.30 am in impressive style by our Mayor, Sharon Perry, with a speech in German, the tone was set for our return to Fritzlar for the 1st time in 5 years (because of Covid), to celebrate the 35th Anniversary of our Twinning, which was established just before the Berlin Wall came down in 1989.



After an overnight stay in Lille, we arrived to the warmest of welcomes by our German friends, many of whom had made a special effort to surprise us. The following day we were given a fascinating tour of the Army Helicopter Base, whose pilots are deployed on NATO Missions, and treated to an excellent dinner in the Mess.

On Thursday we visited the Eder Dam in warm sunshine, followed by a Boat Trip on the Edersee in a dramatic thunderstorm, Museum and "Kaffee & Kuchen" at Schloss Waldeck, where our Twinning was first agreed in 1988, and a drive through glorious countryside in sunshine again to a delicious Buffet Supper in a beautiful rural inn.

Our final day included free time with our hosts, and the Farewell Evening – a wonderful celebration of 35 years of Twinning, with a New Orleans Jazz Band before the meal and, afterwards, a Carnival dancer, now 22, who had entertained us previously aged 9!

On our way home we spent the final night in Ypres, and attended the moving daily Ceremony of Remembrance at the Menin Gate, made even more poignant by post- war reconciliation, and our current relationship with our German partners.

# Report from Street on their trip to Isny im Allgau, July 11th to 16th 2024



Street Twinning had an extremely successful and convivial visit to Isny in July. Twenty-six of us were booked to travel, in the event due to sickness/family issues, 24 of us went. Two new families came, and others were staying with hosts they hadn't stayed with before. Without exception people were very happy with the warm reception given them and forged good links with their hosts.



We had been invited for the weekend of the Kinderfest which is an ancient and annual celebration in the town attracting people from other nearby towns. The highlight was a procession on the Sunday through the town and up to the field where tents were set up for eating and drinking and several bands were playing. We had been asked to dress as a recognisable group and to march in the procession. After a discussion about costume and what people would be comfortable wearing, we opted for red, white and blue outfits, white tops, blue trousers/skirts, and red sashes with small Union jacks and a rose on our shoulder. A peaky blinders type hat completed the outfit. We had lots of cheers and encouragement as we processed through the town. Supper was provided in a tent and thoughtfully our hosts had arranged, later for us, to access a smaller tent with television that was showing the World Cup final (England v Spain).

We were well entertained on the other days. We had a wonderful day out to Bregenz on Lake Constance and the Swiss/Austrian border and visited the fabulous opera house. The Bregenzer Festspiele is a big performing arts festival, and we saw the large floating stage set being prepared for this year's opera 'Der Freischut'. En route we had stopped in Tettnang province at a brewery where we marvelled at the fields of tall hops all around and were treated to a talk on the brewing process with plentiful tastings followed by an excellent lunch. On our last day we visited a nearby Landesgartenshau by the old interesting town of Wangen. The day ended with a final meal outdoors at a restaurant up in the hills with one of our hosts playing her alpenhorn.

The only effort on our part for this trip was organising the travel, a much bigger problem with the rise in fuel and coach costs.

Isny had travelled to us by coach, sharing the coach with a group twinning with Wellington. It involved an overnight stay each way although the cost per person was good. It was clear after consulting our twinners that this was not an option for us.

We also considered train travel as a new service has opened up from Paris to Stuttgart and there is also a direct line to Basle, but the timings didn't work on this occasion, and it was expensive. (However, our German friends have just told us they are thinking of travelling by train to England next year. By everyone purchasing an interrail pass they say it will be a realistic option, watch this space.)

So, we looked at all possibilities if we flew. We are lucky in that our Isny friends said they could meet us at a number of airports including Munich, Stuttgart and Zurich. The coach is paid for by their Town Council. On a previous occasion we had flown from Bristol to Basle where our hosts had met us but there were only weekly flights available this time. Our researchers decided the best and cheapest route was Heathrow to Zurich. There were several daily flights, helpful when bearing in mind the delays and cancellations we had been hearing about.

The other problem with booking flights is ensuring the whole group gets on the same flight which can be challenging with budget airlines. BA has a group booking service which we went through. It was all done online and was a bit nerve wracking as we had to enter full details for each passenger in one go which had to be accurate but was quite straightforward. We also had to ensure on the two dates we had to make payments that Marina, our Treasurer was available as her name is on the twinning credit card and BA insisted the named person was present.

We booked a local coach company to take us to and from Heathrow. We met up at Strode college leaving Street at 7am for a midday flight. Strode college agreed to us leaving cars in the car park as term had finished, provided we left our registration numbers with the office. At Heathrow we were booked in as a group and were quickly on our way through security.

Our hosts were at the airport to meet us, and we had a scenic 2 hour drive back to Isny. After a short welcome at the Town Hall, we went home with our hosts.

The final cost per person was very reasonable (£208) and we were able to subsidise travel for the families with young people from twinning funds.

That evening we met again on the banks of the river Main for drinks and snacks provided by our hosts.







We spent a beautiful evening in this peaceful location, relaxing while watching the huge barges inch their way silently past us, to the strains of live Latin American music.

**SATURDAY**: an hour's drive in glorious weather and through heavy motorway traffic to the Fortuna iron ore mine. It proved to be a fascinating day looking at obsolete locos, visiting the mine via a cramped lift cage and a rudimentary train that took us deep into the cold and darkness of the mountain.

Then back into the sun for a quick Schnitzel and a beer, before a ride around the grounds in refurbished coal trucks. Clean ones, thankfully!





**SUNDAY**: the weather changed dramatically, so a planned picnic in the park enjoying live music was sadly cancelled. We spent the day with our hosts, competing with each other to find some sunshine. So a pleasant day was had exploring local towns such as Limburg, Rüdesheim and Hofheim itself. We learned from our guides about the illustrious history of the spa (Kurhaus), and the various water therapies developed there.
